The Elevating What Works portfolio has supported **36 grants**, totaling **\$7.63 million** since 2017, plus an additional **\$2.94 million in COVID-19 response**.

This fiscal year, the Elevating What Works committee approved the FY25 grant plan, and we have made two national climate and housing justice grants: Climate and Community Institute (\$200,000/two years) and Urban Sustainability Directors Network (\$150,000/two years). Both projects support field-driven solutions and deepen cross-issue relationships to leverage federal climate change funding resources, green social housing, and a tenant climate agenda.

FHO also awarded four grants, each \$80,000/18 months, to members of local homelessness response systems to participate in a Community of Practice (CoP). This CoP will build organizational capacity to engage people with lived experience in decision-making positions as they redesign an aspect of their homelessness response system together. The first full group meeting was in September, and the CoP facilitators will join our January 2025 EWW Committee Meeting to talk about what they are learning. All interested FHO members are invited!

Grantee Partner Success! Louisiana Fair Housing Action Center (LFHAC) hired a new executive director this year after the long-time executive director moved. LFHAC leads several local and state collaboratives. They completed a data mapping and analysis of segregation in use of Project-Based Section 8 and Housing Choice Voucher subsidies in New Orleans. LFHAC also advocated for and won a New Orleans-wide Healthy Home Program (HHP), which has recently launched and is already remediating substandard housing conditions that create health and safety hazards. The HHP prioritizes inspecting properties of households that call LFHAC's hotline.

 the Florida Eviction Prevention Collaborative, a coalition of partners working to improve conditions for renters in MiamiDade County and across Florida by ensuring people issued eviction notices know about and are afforded their right to
 counsel.
- Homelessness Action Network Detroit (\$80,000 over 18 months, ending 3/2026) HAND is the Continuum of Care (CoC) lead for Detroit, Michigan participating in the Homelessness Response Systems Community of Practice. The cohort is made up of CoC and nonprofit staff and people experiencing homelessness.
- <u>KC Tenants</u> (\$330,000 over 18 months, ending 3/2025) KCT is a citywide tenant union, led by multigenerational, multiracial, poor and working-class tenants in Kansas City, Missouri. KCT runs a tenants' rights hotline and organizes tenants for collective bargaining to stop building-wide evictions.
- <u>The Neighborhood Developers</u> and partners (\$250,000 over 18 months, ending 3/2025) TND leads the Chelsea Anti-Displacement Roundtable which aims to stabilize housing by expanding access to rental assistance and affordable housing preservation and production and by increasing tenants' participation in local decision-making.
- <u>Piedmont Housing Alliance</u> and partners (\$250,000 over 18 months, ending 3/2025) PHA is working to expand the new Financial Opportunity Center and Housing Hub to address generational racial inequity by offering financial stability, housing navigation, rental assistance, eviction prevention, and tenant-landlord mediation services.

 Mayors and C40 to launch a multi-city project to expand the engagement of community members to determine policy
 solutions and access public funding to implement them.
- Welcome Home Coalition (\$250,000 over one year, ending 8/2025) WHC advocates for housing resources and engages
 people with lived experience of housing insecurity to participate in housing stability oversight committees across the tricounty area.

Grant Renewals in Process

• <u>Louisiana Fair Housing Action Center</u> (under consideration: \$250,000 over 18 months, ending 4/2026) - LaFHAC works to halt evictions and foreclosures, help place unhoused people in hotels, expand eviction/foreclosure counseling capacity, create tools for tenants to negotiate with landlords, and represent undocumented tenants.

The Narrative Change portfolio has **three active grants totaling \$725,000** and **a \$300,000 pending renewal** to Housing Narrative Lab. FHO has granted **\$3.9 million** to housing narrative change efforts since 2018.

Strategy Success! Historic levels of coordination across the field in response to *Johnson v. Grants Pass* shifted public and media dialogue toward more compassionate and informed perspectives on homelessness, in which all FHO Narrative Change grantee partners were a part of. While we'll continue to see how narrative efforts are impacting narrative shifts for the long term, research is already showing a significant impact:

- Housing Narrative Lab measured a 15% increase between 2021 and 2024 in public understanding of economic factors as the primary cause of homelessness.
- Through recent polling, <u>National Alliance to End Homelessness</u> saw that respondents increasingly identify the lack of affordable housing as a driver of homelessness, rather than addiction or mental illness.
- <u>National Homelessness Law Center</u> identified a shift in how the media framed *Johnson v. Grants Pass*-related stories, focusing on root causes vs. "clearing encampments."

Now in the third phase of their narrative change work supported by FHO, <u>Race Forward</u> and <u>PolicyLink</u> are leaning into their constituencies and supporting organizers, advocates, artists, cultural institutions, and government practitioners to integrate narrative as a key lever of achieving housing justice. For example, PolicyLink's <u>Spatial Futures Initiative</u> aims to catalyze reparative justice in land and housing.

An expert in adapting to how audiences consume media, <u>Invisible People</u> continues to reach millions across multiple platforms each year including TikTok, YouTube, Instagram, and more. For instance, Invisible People's documentary on how Finland solved homelessness has been viewed over 2.3 million times.

In October, FHO presented during a showcase session at the Communications Network's Annual Conference to define narrative change in the context of housing justice and highlight how FHO grantee partners are building narrative infrastructure and putting theory into practice.

The Policy, Advocacy, and Organizing portfolio has supported **28 grants**, totaling **\$10.25 million** since 2017.

Over the past six months, the Policy, Advocacy and Organizing committee approved the FY25 grant plan. The three grants to statewide organizing networks were renewed, two for \$200,000 (two years) and one for \$100,000 (one year). Social Good Fund received a grant for the Bridge to Power project (\$277,000/six months) to support planning for Resident Organizing Networks and their partners who were formerly supported by Community Change. The National Low Income Housing Coalition received a grant (\$140,000/three years) to maintain the Housing Trust Fund website and tools that Community Change previously managed.

Staff sent a survey to all FHO grantee partners about activities and issue areas they are working on related to local, state, and federal elections. We offered FHO members an opportunity to send the survey to their grantee partners, and the Hilton Foundation sent it to a subset of their grantees. Grantee partners are working on issue advocacy, community engagement, and policy research and analysis. The top three issue areas grantee partners are working on are increasing funding for housing, tenant protections, and criminalization of homelessness. Fair Housing is the other issue that had a handful of responses. Many respondents indicated that they have a desire to connect with others working on housing justice policy issues, and FHO will support this by hosting one or two virtual events to facilitate peer-to-peer learning and sharing after the election.

Several grantee partners are already working together in preparation for the Presidential Transition. <u>Alliance for Housing Justice</u>, the <u>National Coalition for Housing Justice</u>, National Low Income Housing Coalition, and other national partners are collaborating on responses and advocacy toolkits about policy opportunities announced by the Biden-Harris Administration this summer that they feel should continue, ranging from a potential national rent cap and resources to update land use and zoning codes to remove barriers to affordable housing development.
